3	Learning outcomes: By studying the <i>Slavic-Romanian Paleography</i> students will form/develop the following Generic Competences:: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Search, identification and use of effective methods and techniques in order to continuous learning with the aim of adjusting to the labor market requirements. 2. 4	Subject aims. The course aims at researching internal documents issues by medieval princes of Moldavia and Vallachia. More exactly, the students should learn about the emergence of Slavic-Romanian writing in Romanian territories, of use of it for a long time due to the fact the prince and churches employed it as main form of writing. The course addresses also various problems of Slavic ancient texts written in Glagolitic and Slavonic numbering system, and teaching student show to date and decode graphical tools, special writing systems etc. Discipline is aimed primarily at students interested in the deciphering and transcribing medieval documents issued by the Romanian princes and individuals in the territory of Moldavia, Wallachia and Transylvania.				
5	Teaching Methods description, explanation, case-studies, reading, presentation of individual projects, group work etc.				
6	Assessment Methods: For the assessment of the studying at the discipline Slavic-Romanian Paleography there will used the following: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. <i>Continuing assessment</i> – used during the educational process at the lectures, seminars, consultations, two mandatory tests during the semester and assessment of individual work. The outcome of the current assessment represents 60 % from the final mark. 2. <i>Final assessment</i> – is done in the form of a written exam. The outcome of the written exam constitutes 40 % of the final mark. a) The final mark at the discipline is calculated according to the Rules for academic assessment of SUM: semester mark (60%) + exam mark (40%) - The semester rating (outcome of the current assessment) is calculated as follows: 30 % average assessment at the seminars + 30% average of the two semester tests + 40% assessment of the individual
